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#### 1. SURVEY DETAILS

#### 1.1 PROJECT NAME

This project is known as the Harker Heritage Property – Area 2-3-4.

#### 1.3 LOCATION

The Harker Heritage Property is located approximately 50 km northeast of Kirkland Lake, Ontario. The property consists of 375 mining claims comprising of over 850 units spanning Clifford, Elliott, Harker, Holloway, Tannahill and Marriott Townships within the Larder Lake Mining Division.

#### 1.4 Access

Access to the property was attained with a 4x4 truck via highway 672 and highway 101. Numerous forestry access roads and trails were travelled by snowmobile to access the various parts of the property.

Area 2 is located within Elliott Township. Access to this area was directly off of highway 672 approximately 30 kilometers north of its intersection with highway 66. From here an ATV was used to access the survey region.

Area 3 and 4 are located within Elliott Township. Access to these areas was via highway 672. Approximately 31.6 kilometers north of the intersection highway 66 the property crosses the highway. At this location the truck was parked and an ATV was used for the remainder of the access.

#### 1.5 SURVEY AREA

The survey area was designed to be a reconnaissance survey through the claim group. The traversed lines were established using a GPS in conjunction with the execution of the survey and were based on topography and a path of least resistance.

The traverse for Area 2 covers a portion of mining claims 4210175, 4203545, 3013919 and 4266596 which is located in Elliott Township within the Larder Lake Mining Division.

The traverse for Area 3 covers a portion of mining claim 3013919, 4225037, 4209405 which are located in Elliott Township within the Larder Lake Mining Division.

The traverse for Area 4 covers a portion of mining claim 4257139 which is located in Elliott Township within the Larder Lake Mining Division.

#### 2.3 SURVEY SPECIFICATIONS

The survey was conducted with a GSM-19 v7 Overhauser magnetometer with a second GSM-19 magnetometer in base station mode for diurnal correction.

A total of 10.95 line kilometers of Magnetometer was read over the Harker Heritage Property between February 29<sup>th</sup> and March 1<sup>st</sup>, 2016. This consisted of 10418 magnetometer samples taken at a 1 second sample interval.



#### 3. OVERVIEW OF SURVEY RESULTS

#### 3.1 SUMMARY




Figure 2: Magnetometer Readings

The purpose of the magnetic survey was as a reconnaissance tool, to assist in tying historic surveys together. A total of 10.95 kilometers of traverses were performed over area 2, 3 and 4.

Generally, the magnetic signature indicates a generally uniform regional magnetic signature.

There appears to be a localized magnetic increase over the north portion of claim 3013919 that does not appear to correlate with any other part of the reconnaissance area. This may indicate the presence of an intrusive.

The westerly portion indicates some localized elevated magnetic responses that appear to trend in a north south direction. These most likely represent some regional dikes.

I would recommend compiling the historic ground magnetic data and leveling it to this survey. This compared with other geoscientific data will provide a more reliable geological image of the area.

#### **APPENDIX B**

#### THEORETICAL BASIS AND SURVEY PROCEDURES

#### **TOTAL FIELD MAGNETIC SURVEY**

Base station corrected Total Field Magnetic surveying is conducted using at least two synchronized magnetometers of identical type. One magnetometer unit is set in a fixed position in a region of stable geomagnetic gradient, and away from possible cultural effects (i.e. moving vehicles) to monitor and correct for daily diurnal drift. This magnetometer, given the term 'base station', stores the time, date and total field measurement at fixed time intervals over the survey day. The second, remote mobile unit stores the coordinates, time, date, and the total field measurements simultaneously. The procedure consists of taking total magnetic measurements of the Earth's field at stations, along individual profiles, including Tie and Base lines. A 2 meter staff is used to mount the sensor, in order to optimally minimize localized near-surface geologic noise. At the end of a survey day, the mobile and base-station units are linked, via RS-232 ports, for diurnal drift and other magnetic activity (ionospheric and sferic) corrections using internal software.

For the gradiometer application, two identical sensors are mounted vertically at the ends of a rigid fiberglass tube. The centers of the coils are spaced a fixed distance apart (0.5 to 1.0m). The two coils are then read simultaneously, which alleviates the need to correct the gradient readings for diurnal variations, to measure the gradient of the total magnetic field.

These "supercharged" quantum magnetometers also deliver high absolute accuracy, rapid cycling (up to 5 readings / second), and exceptionally low power consumption.

The Overhauser effect occurs when a special liquid (with unpaired electrons) is combined with hydrogen atoms and then exposed to secondary polarization from a radio frequency (RF) magnetic field. The unpaired electrons transfer their stronger polarization to hydrogen atoms, thereby generating a strong precession signal—that is ideal for very high-sensitivity total field measurement. In comparison with proton precession methods, RF signal generation also keeps power consumption to an absolute minimum and reduces noise (i.e. generating RF frequencies are well out of the bandwidth of the precession signal).

In addition, polarization and signal measurement can occur simultaneously - which enables faster, sequential measurements. This, in turn, facilitates advanced statistical averaging over the sampling period and/or increased cycling rates (i.e. sampling speeds).




