- LOCATION These claims are situated in the north-east corner of Nameigos Township, in the Oug Area, of the Sault Ste Marie Mining Division of Ontario. The property is approximately 51.5 miles south-west of Cha on the Canadian National Railways, and 23.5 miles west of north from Brang where the Canadian Pacific and Algoma Central railways intersect.
- ACCRES - From Cha, on the C N R the claims may be reached by a water and portage route by way of the Oba River and Kabinakagami Lake and River, and a further trail of about two miles. It is possible for a plane to use a small lake about two miles from the camp, particularly in the winter time.
- GWNERSHIP The property is held by an organization of interested claim o'mers which is known as the Stenabaugh Syndicate, of which Mr A. M. Jarvis, 149 Pim Street, Smilt Ste Marie, Ontario, is the secretary, and Mr John Ryan, also of Sault Ste Marie, is the trustee appointed for purposes of the ortioning of the property.

During the option period 21 additional claims were staked on behalf of Consolidated, but these were never recorded and allowed to lapse.

HON THE - The principal claims were staked following the discovery HISTORY made by James E Stenabaugh and associates during the summer of 1935. Some exploratory work in the nature of general prospecting and trenching was accomplished during the fall of the year.

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Sten-bauch Syndicate Claims - 2

In December, 1935, the claims were presented for the investigation of Consolidated by Messrs James Stenabaugh and Thomas Morrison. Grab samples brought in by these men returned assay values of 0.30, 0.40, 0.12 and 0.02 in gold.

In January, 1936, the property was visited by Mr D C McKechnie, following which there was submitted a report which recommended further exploration work and the acquisition of an option upon the claims by Consolidated.

Meanwhile the different owners of the various claims in the group formed a Syndicate with A E Jarvis, as Secretary, and John Ryan, as Trustee. This was to facilitate negotiations in connection with the optioning of the claims in a group.

Subsequently an option agreement was arranged and duly completed as between the Syndicate and Consolidated. The total purchase price was \$150,000 but no immediate cash payments were required, the stipulation being that exploration work be proceeded with at once. Payments arranged in the option agreement were to be wade as follows:

On August 1st 1936 - \$5,000.00 On December 1st 1936 - \$5,000.00 On April 1st 1937 - \$10,000.00 On August 1st 1937 - \$20,000.00 On Pebruary 1st 1938 - \$50,000.00 On August 1st 1938 - \$50,000.00

GENERAL GEOLOGY - The rocks occurring in this area are of a general old age, and include a granite gneiss which is considered to be of an older period than the more common Keewatin formation.

A belt of Keewatin schist complex crosses the property in a general SW-NE direction. About two claims to the west of the showings there is a granitic gness occurrence, while approximately 1 miles north-west of the workings there is a nose of Algoman granite.

The showings occur in a silicified sone which indicated a south-easterly trend to cut the formation obliquely. Eineralization is principally pyrite, which frequently occurs in seams. Somewhat erratio values in gold were obtainable.

In the immediate area there are two such rones indicated. The one is on the south end of the property, while the second is about one-half mile south-west upon

the Saunby Claims.

DEVELOPMENT - By the Owners: Ecome surface work in the nature of trenching had been accomplished by the owners of the claims but the amount done was insufficient to permit a definite appraisal of the property's murits. Near the south boundary of the group controlled by the Syndicate a trench exposed what appeared to be an extensive silicified and pyritised zone carrying a 5 50 % strike and a dip of 70-75 degrees to the north-east. Throughout the 38-foot cross-trench mineralization persisted in varying amounts, while neither wall of the zone was indicated. Several samples were taken from this trench upon the occasion of Mr McKechnie's visit. These, commencing from the SE end of the trench, were as follow:

By Consolidated: On January 16th 1936 the movement of a crew of men and an outfit into the property was commenced. From Missinable, on the Canadian Pacific Railway 23.8 miles east of Franz, eleven plane trips within two days completed the freighting to a small lake near the proposed camp site. Tent-camps were erected for the accommodation of the crew, and shortly a program of surface trenching was begun.

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Stenabaugh Syndicate Claims - 4

Cverburden proved to be somewhat heavier than had been anticipated, but by February 19th there had been completed 215.0 linear feet of trenching. The bedrock was broken by drilling and blasting. Samples were taken from mineralized sections exposed.

Results of this work was to indicate that the zone of mineralization did not continue through as expected, and further work proved distinctly disappointing. Further samples taken returned negligible values in gold. Meanwhile instructions came through requesting the discontinuation of the exploration work; the crew was then promptly withdrawn on February 20th 1936. The usump and equipment was left in care of a man who was personally interested in the property.

In that exploration work had been somewhat hampered by snow and winter conditions, particularly so after the trand of the zone had been lest, it was deemed advisable to have another examination of the claims made in the early spring. Mr G H Morrison visited the property in the first part of June; his letter under date of June 14, 1936, gives the following information concerning the property and the immediate area:

"On claims surrounding the Company's option in "Nameigos Township, and held by Stenabaugh, "Saunby, Conell (?), and others interested parties, prospecting with considerable stripping and trenching has been done, both last fall and this spring, which upon examination has disclosed nothing of encouragement for the near-by area. In fact, with the exception of Stenabaugh, all other interested parties have either pulled out or completed their assessment work for the year, and appear to be now hanging on for further action from the Smelters!

Arrangements were made for the removal of the camp outfit by way of Oba on the Canadian National.

On June 17th 1936, a formal notice of abandonment of the property and the option thereon was served upon the Sectetary of the Syndicate.

Work done upon the property permitted the recording of assessment work for another year, and this was accordingly done.


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
